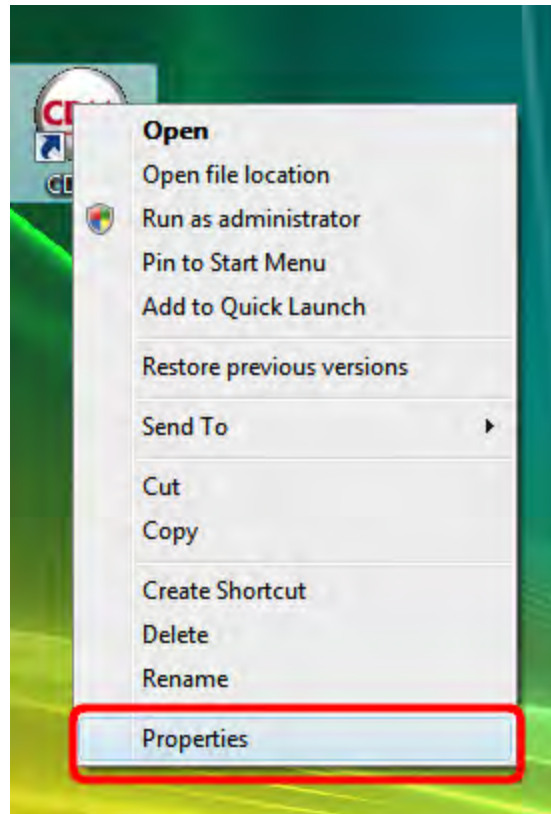


Installing CDM+ 8.1.2 on a PC running Microsoft Windows Vista

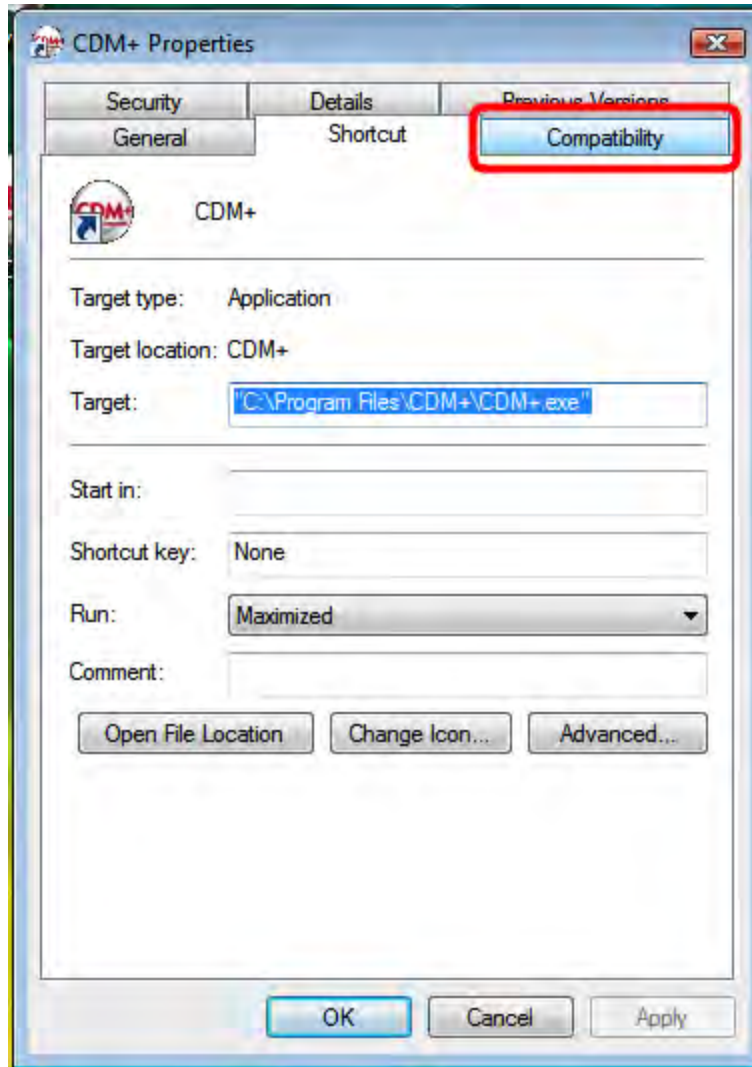
Setup CDM+ to run in Microsoft Windows Vista

Set Properties for CDM+



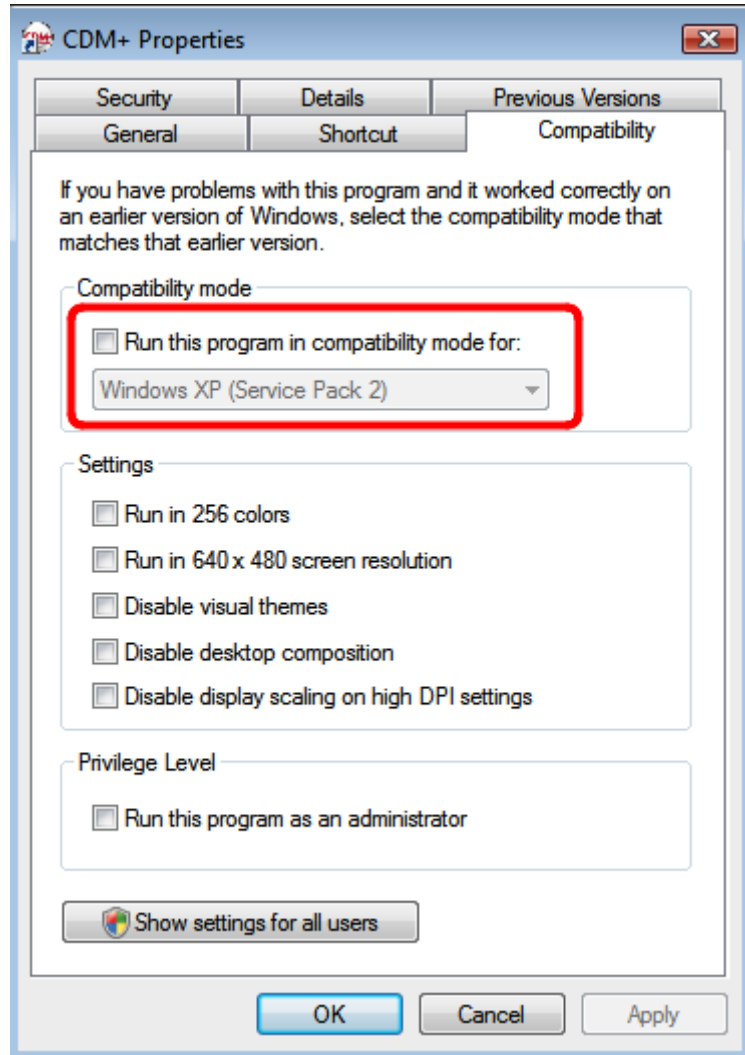
After the installation, there will be a shortcut of CDM+ on your Desktop. Right-click the CDM+ icon and a menu will display. Select Properties at the bottom of the list.

Select the Compatibility tab



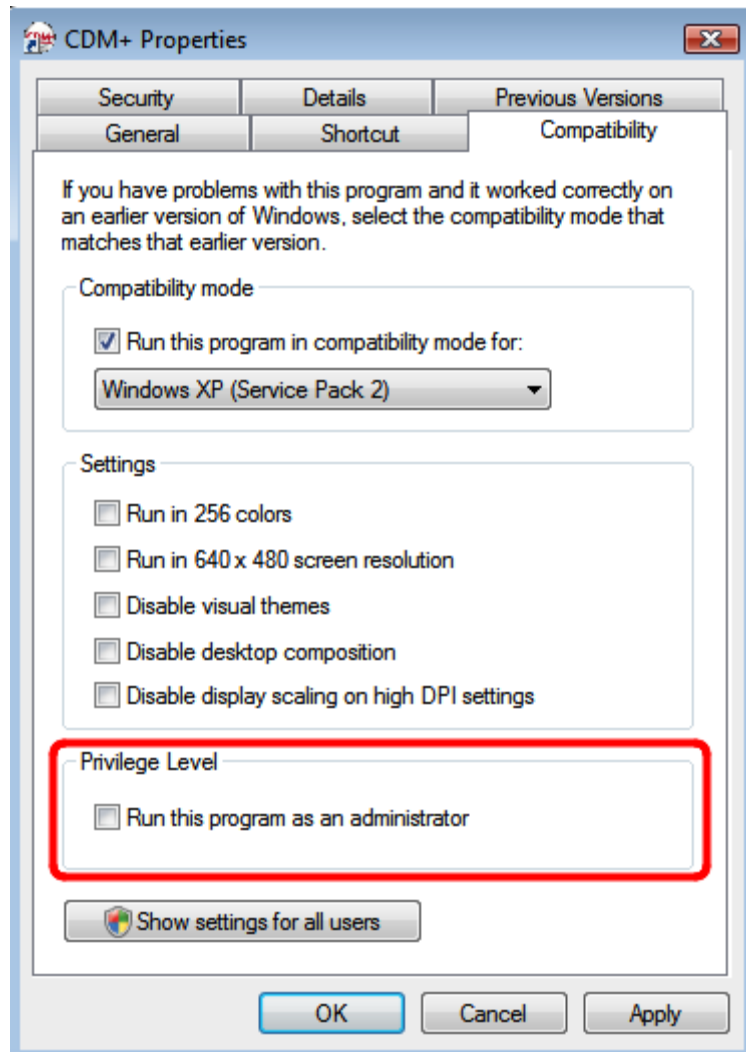
Click on the Compatibility tab.

Set CDM+ to run in Compatibility mode



Click on the checkbox for "Run this program in compatibility mode for." This will set CDM+ to run in Windows XP (Service Pack 2) compatibility mode.

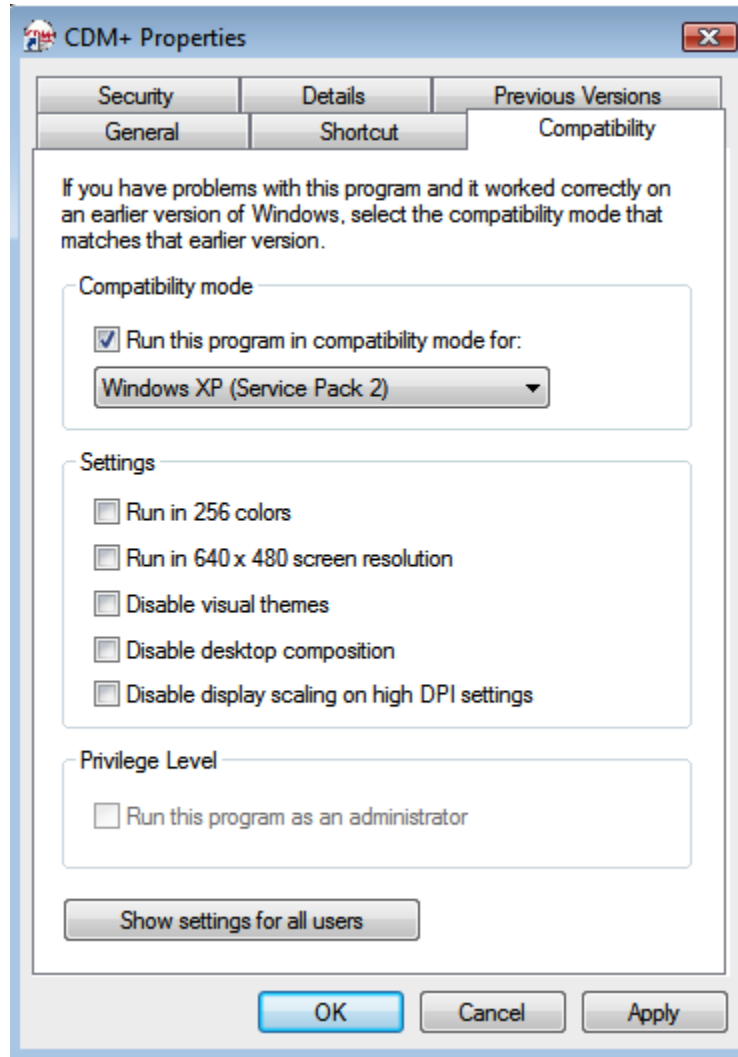
Set the privilege level



Click on the checkbox for "Run this program as an administrator." ***If the "Run this program as an administrator" is grayed out, go to the next step.*** Otherwise click the Apply button to apply your changes and then click the OK button to close the Properties window.

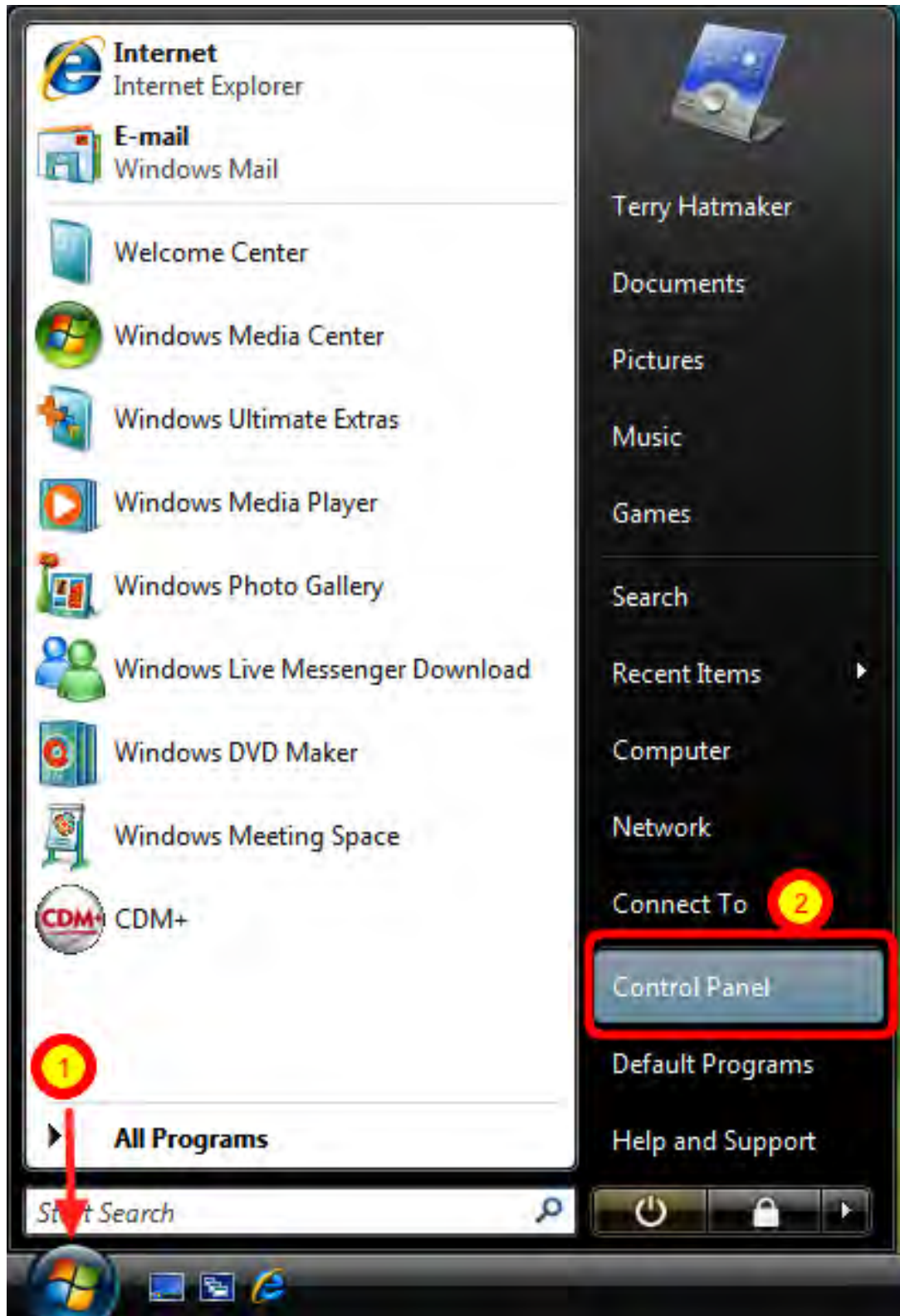
You are now ready to continue the installation process.

The "Run this program as an administrator" is grayed out and cannot be checked.



If the "Run this program as an administrator" is grayed out, then you have disabled User Access Control under the User Accounts. In order to be able to run CDM+, you must turn User Access Control back on temporarily.

Open Control Panel window



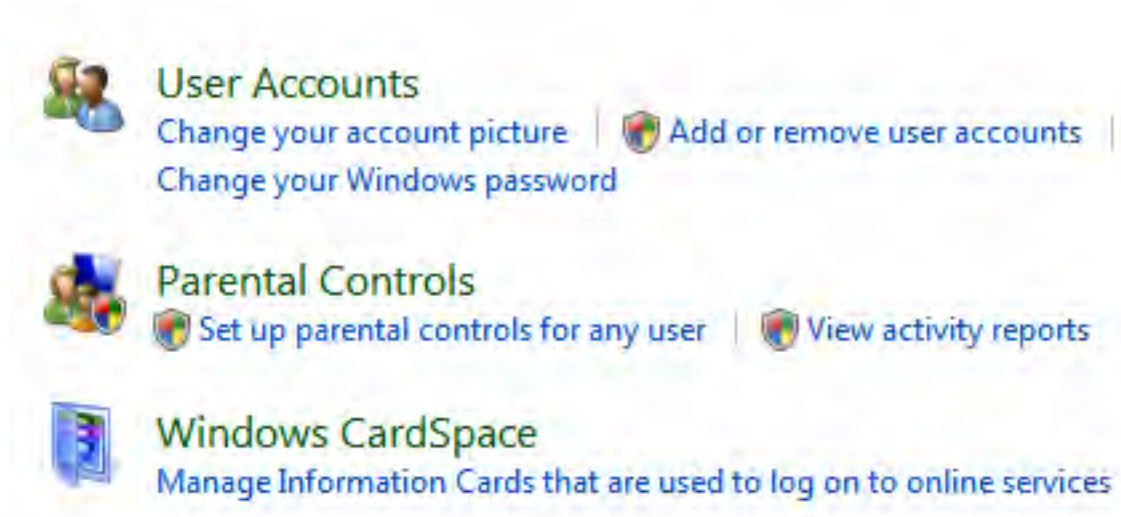
Open Control Panel by (1) clicking on the Start button and (2) selecting Control Panel.

Select User Accounts and Family Safety

Click on the link (the words) "User Accounts and Family Safety."

Open User Accounts window



Click on the link (the words) User Accounts to go to the window where you can make changes to your user account.

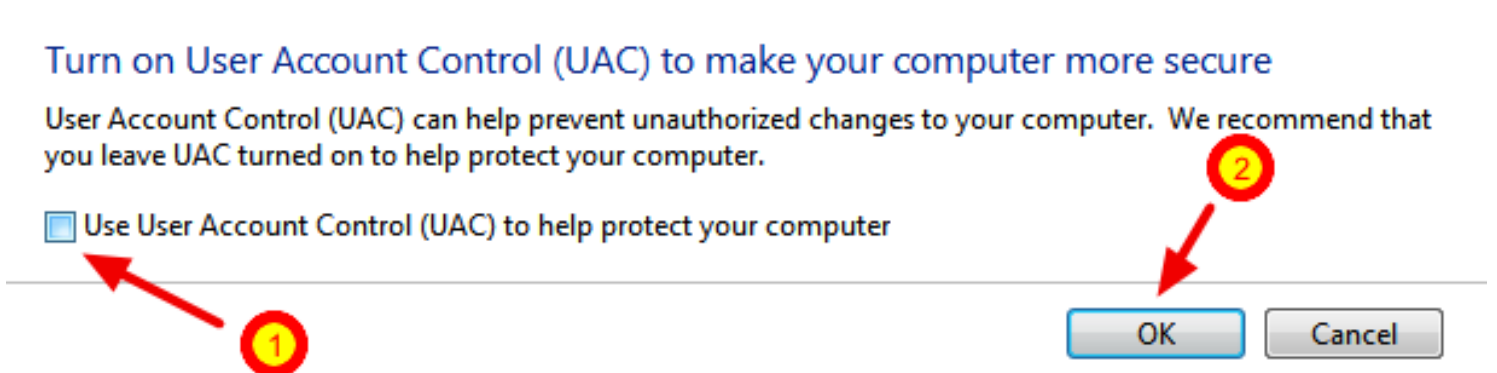
Open "Turn User Account Control on or off"



Click on "Turn User Account Control on or off" to take you to the next window.

If you do not have access to make this change under your Windows User Account, then you will need to speak with someone at the church who maintains your computer systems.

Turn on User Account Control



(1) Put a check in the check box to turn on User Account Control (UAC).

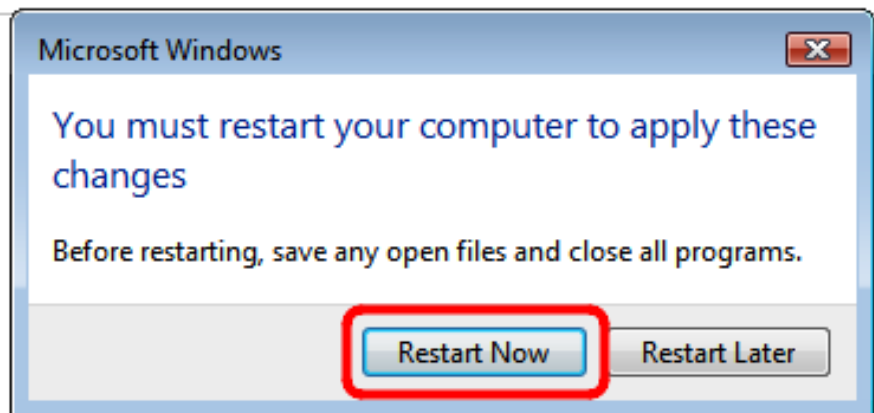
(2) Click the OK button

Restart Windows Vista or Windows 7

Turn on User Account Control (UAC) to make your computer more secure

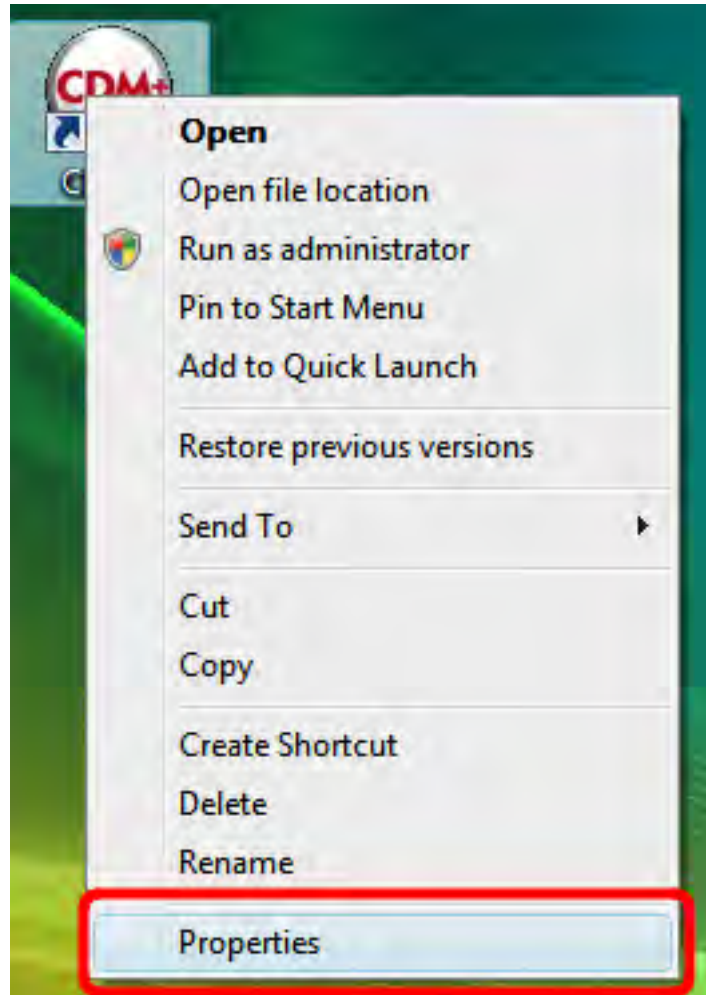
User Account Control (UAC) can help prevent unauthorized changes to your computer. We recommend that you leave UAC turned on to help protect your computer.

Use User Account Control (UAC) to help protect your computer



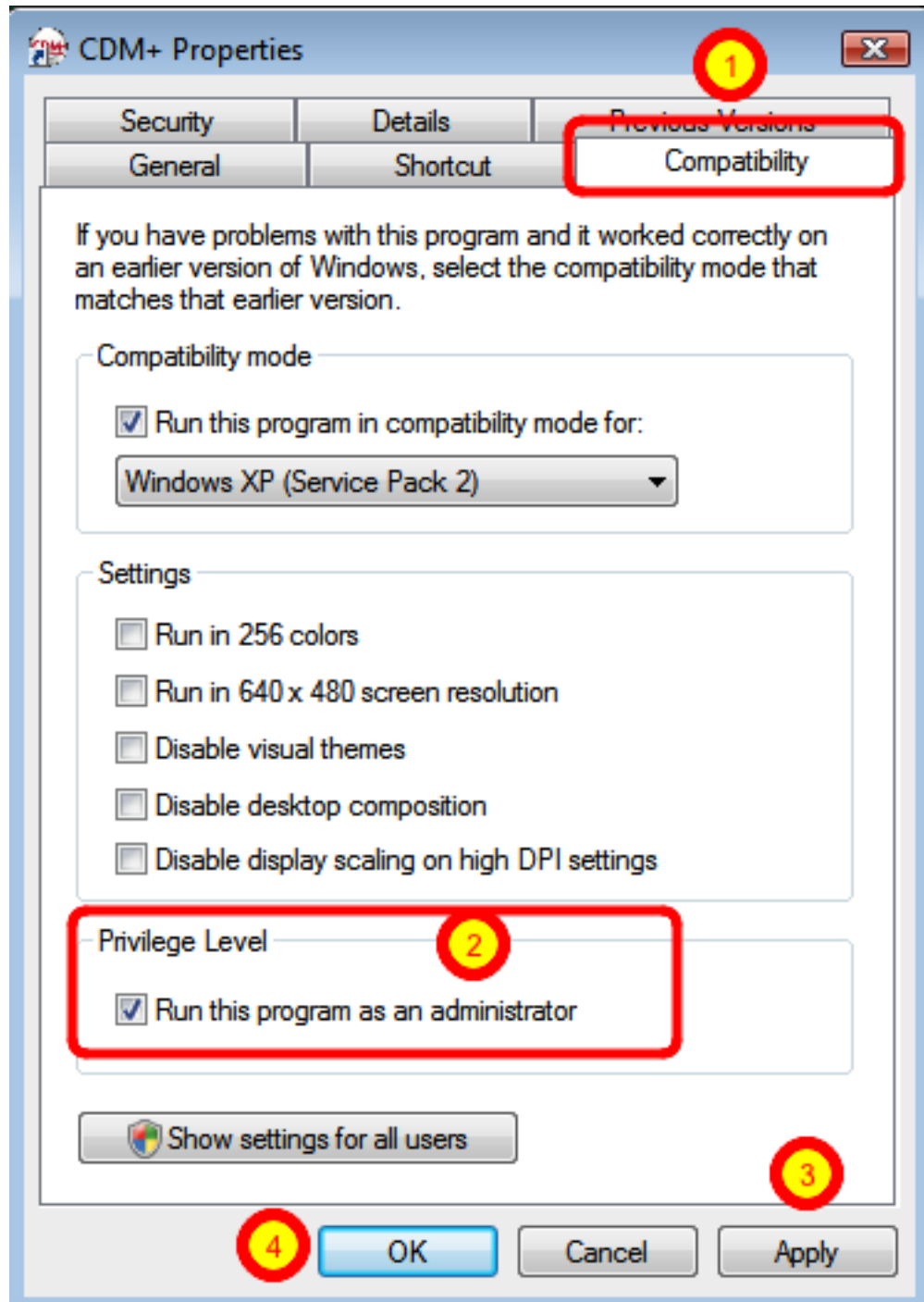
Click on Restart Now to make the changes.

Open CDM+ Properties window.



Right-click on the CDM+ shortcut on the Desktop and select Properties from the menu.

Select the Compatibility tab



- (1) Click on the Compatibility tab. This will display the window where the "Run this program as an administrator" was grayed out previously. You will notice that it is no longer grayed out.
- (2) Put a check in the check box. The Apply button will become active.

- (3) Click the Apply button to apply the change.
- (4) Click the OK button to close the Properties window.

Please note: the check box for "Run this program in compatibility mode for:" must also be checked.

Now you may turn User Account Control back off

Follow the steps above to get to the window to turn User Account Control off. Here is a summary:

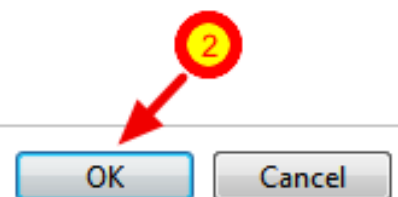
- (1) Open the Control Panel window.
- (2) Click on User Accounts and Family Safety
- (3) Click on User Accounts (the words)
- (4) Click on Turn User Account Control on or off
- (5) Click on the Continue button when you get the window, "Windows needs your permission to continue"

Turn off User Account Control

Turn on User Account Control (UAC) to make your computer more secure

User Account Control (UAC) can help prevent unauthorized changes to your computer. We recommend that you leave UAC turned on to help protect your computer.

Use User Account Control (UAC) to help protect your computer



- (1) Uncheck the checkbox "Use User Account Control (UAC) to help protect your computer."
- (2) Click OK
- (3) When prompted, click on Restart Now.

Once Windows restarts, you are ready to continue the CDM+ installation process.
